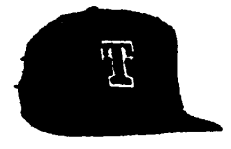

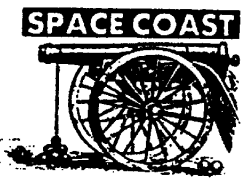

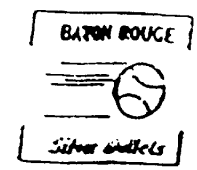

04. 01/21/91: GM's mail protected rosters, draft picks owned and phone number for **DRAFT DAY** to the Commissioner.
05. 01/28/91: 1. Commissioner mails protected rosters to GM's.
2. Commissioner mails official draft order to GM's.
3. Commissioner mails seasonal package to GM's. (Trade slips, schedule, reporting forms)
06. 02/04/91: GM's mail written draft instructions to the Commissioner.

KLUBBER KLIPS: * Off season fireworks again afflicted a usually peaceful fall in the Connecticut Valley. GM and Owner-for-Life Klee was confronted with more bizarre allegations from Windsor owner Boucher. With his customary aplomb, Klee shrugged off the Windsor Whiner. "I've never even met this Pallone individual but it seems rather curious that he has a frequent mouth piece through Boucher. Think about it."

Sources close to Boucher have suggested that Boucher's frame of mind was upset by his recently failed gubernatorial campaign in which he failed to out poll even such perennial write-in stalwarts as Dick Nixon, Mickey Mouse and Alfred E. WINTER MEETINGS

Now, here's the deal....

Mystic and Space Coast swap Winfield and Charlie Hayes.

The Holstiens traded right fielder Dave Winfield to the Cannons for Charlie Hayes in the first deal of the winter meetings.

The Holstiens also sent Jack Daughtery and Willie Wilson to the Cannons for Gerald Perry, Tom Gregg and two draft picks.

Winfield, known for his leaping catches, is one of the best defensive outfielders in baseball hit .267, with 21 homers and 78 RBI.

"One of our problems last year was outfield defense," Cannons GM Billings said, "We got him for defense. We're not worried about his hitting."

Hayes hit .258, with 10 homers and 57 RBI. "We wanted to get someone in return who could play third-base and was younger" said GM Groboski.

Space Coast reportedly offered Hayes to Allyn Street but they could not agree on a deal.

Here is a look at some of the teams in the **Fly-By-Night** and what they will seek to accomplish during the Winter Meetings.

Windsor shopping; Willimantic hung up

Windsor: Will they be able to get the man they need so they can draft the player they want. The feeling is it maybe time to trade a veteran so they can get the young player they're interested in.

Willimantic: The Bobby Bonilla situation has the Warriors frozen. If they can re-sign him, and they desperately need to, they can move another player in a trade, Cory Snyder?

Allyn Street: The 89ers stood pat after surprising everybody in 1986 and discovered, the hard way, that old players and old teams don't automatically get better the next year, They usually just get older. A young starter like Ramon Martinez will settle the rotation a little but they'll be looking for another fireballer to help Martinez. The 89ers are willing to part with Chris James or Dan Gladden for some pop and infield help. They also hope to re-sign free agent Ellis Burks.

Florida: The Sun likes Lilliquist. Bothered by arm trouble for two years, 5-11 5.31 in 122IP, the Sun hope Lilliquist can bounce back. "He's shown he can go out there and pitch the innings, said GM Gerek.

New England: The Lime Sox surprised a lot of people by giving outfielder Otis Nixon \$6 million over the next three years, and that might not be their only plunge in the trading pool. They're also looking for an experienced starting pitcher and could go after one of the Cannons. Ozzie Smith has been on the trade block for some time. This might be the week the Sox unload him, but only if somebody gives up a proven, starting pitcher in payment.

Space Coast: Scott Garrelts, 12-11 182IP, is likely to become the third pitcher to flee the Cannons this year. The club watched Dave Johnson and Doug Jones sign big contracts elsewhere, The Cannons are in the market for a right-handed hitting run producer; hence their reported interest in Cory Snyder, Chris James and Dave Winfield.

Galactic: The Gladiators haven't been able to bask in the glow of their division title, instead, they've been wondering who they'll be able to persuade to return for their title defense. Lefty starter Zane Smith, a big part of Galactic's pennant push, is likely to leave the Gladiators if not offer more money. GM Walters said the clubs top priority is to re-sign free agent Eric Davis.

USJ: Last year the Admirals, Whippets and Jarheads were throwing millions at first baseman Pete O'Brien, The Jarheads won, then lost: O'Brien broke a thumb, hit .224 and has a no-trade clause. That makes him very expensive.

Salem: The Psychics, once the FBN's most active trading team on behalf of aging Rich Hamel, now say they want to build through the draft and the farm system, but old habits fade reluctantly, and "make me an offer" Hamel may want to attract some offers. Glen Hill may be gone if anyone offers the right outfielder in return.

Klees: The Kubbers, once again, will be trolling for a catcher. Unconvinced that Tony Pena can help them next year and no longer willing to gamble, they would settle for Sandy Alomar in the draft or go after Willimantic's M. Stanley. But, they won't be chasing big-bucks free agents.

Allyn Street: The 89ers will bear little resemblance to the disappointment team that opened 1990. Already gone are Ozzie Guillan, Fred Mandrique, Ken Caminiti (benched) and Cris James. So Allyn Street is in the market for help in almost all areas, but especially in the coaching boxes. Will Holawaty let Bruno return.

AMERICAN LEAGUE PLAYOFFS

Teem defeated Galatic in a closely fought six game series. With both teams loaded with stars a couple of unlikely heroes surfaced for Teem. Down 2 games to none and trailing 4-3 in the bottom of the tenth, Greg Gagne provided the spark Teem needed by going deep with Don Mattingly aboard and give Teem the 5-4 win and the momentum they needed.

The victory rallied Teem as they went on to sweep the next 3 games. Nolan Ryan shut out Galatic in game 4 on a four hitter. Teems runs came on a walk, single, double play in the first and a Molitor home run in the eighth. Game 5 went into extra innings before Ernie Riles drove in Robin Yount with a 2 out single. Davis and Santiago homered in the third to account for Galatics scoring. Teem tied the game in the eighth with four runs to force the extra innings. Game six was another nail biter. Teem jumped out to a early 1-0 lead. Galatic came back and scored 2 runs in both the fourth and fifth innings for a 4-1 lead. Series MVP Robin Yount (.375, 6, 2) got Teem within one with a 2 run homer in the sixth. Slumping Kevin Mitchell (.120, 3 hits, 2 RBI, 0 HR) tied the game in seventh with a bases loaded single off Lee Smith. In the eighth, Mickey Hatcher was the hero as he hit a 2 run pinch hit homer to seal the pennant for Teem.

Galatic displayed some timely hitting in game one as they took a 4-3 win and the early series lead. Power was evident in game 2. Teem built a 7-4 lead through the eighth inning on homers by Yount, Mattingly and Gagne but Eric Davis (.250, 10, 4) rescued Galatic with a monstrous grand slam in the bottom of the eighth off Bill Landrum. Earlier, Murray had homered twice and Fernandez once to account for Galatics runs.
